ROBERT HELPS (1928 – 2001) was a composer, pianist, and teacher who received many honors and awards during his lifetime. Recognition for his compositions came from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Guggenheim Foundation, the American Academy of Arts and Letters, Fromm Foundation, Naumberg award, and others. Among his pieces are two symphonies, two piano concerti, piano quartets, and trios.

He remained active as a recording artist and solo and chamber music performer, appearing with several orchestras. Helps toured extensively with internationally renowned performers including vocalists Bethany Beardslee and Phyllis Curtin, violinists Isidore Cohen and Rudolf Kolisch, and composer/pianist Aaron Copland. Known for his expertise in performing nineteenth and twentieth-century music, he presented recitals of music by composers as diverse as Chopin, Ravel, Roger Sessions, John Ireland, Milton Babbitt, and Virgil Thompson. Helps' recordings, including those of his own music have been released on the Victor, Columbia, CRI, Deutsche Grammophon, New World, Desto, Son Nova, and GM labels.

Helps was a professor of piano at the New England Conservatory, the San Francisco Conservatory, Princeton University, Stanford University, the University of California at Berkeley, the Manhattan School of Music, the San Francisco Conservatory, and at the University of South Florida. He was artist-inresidence at the University of California at Davis in 1973, and a recipient of an honorary *Doctor of Humane Letters* from the University of St. Thomas in St. Paul, Minnesota, and the San Francisco Conservatory. His major teachers Abby Whiteside and Roger Sessions.
